2	MR. MARTIN: It's September 10th about 5:52, my
3	name is Jim Martin with the Federal Energy Regulatory
4	Commission. And we are conducting a Public Comment Meeting
5	for the Alaska LNG Project. At this time the meeting
6	started at 5 and we've yet to receive any individuals
7	wishing to comment. We would, however, like to open the
8	meeting and for that we've asked James to provide a prayer.
9	MALE SPEAKER: Okay, let's pray. Lord, we thank
10	you for this day and we ask for your blessings to this
11	meeting. As always in this, in Your time and Your way, Your
12	will be done and all for Your glory, Amen.
13	MR. MARTIN: Thank you James. Now, I would like
14	to hand the microphone to Earl Williams, to provide a
15	statement for the Bureau of Land Management.
16	MR. WILLIAMS: My name is Earl Williams, and I'm
17	a Project Manager with the Bureau of Land Management. I am
18	reading this statement into the record to let you know that
19	this public meeting is also a subsistence hearing.
20	Section 8-10 of the Alaska National Interest
21	Lands Conservation Act or ANILCA, requires the BLM to
22	evaluate the effects of its actions on subsistence uses and
23	to hold public hearings as it finds its subsistence use may
24	be significantly restricted.
25	The Alaska LNG Project is seeking a right-of-way

1 from the BLM to allow for the construction and operation of 2 the buried pipeline across public lands. In reviewing this 3 application, the BLM must consider the potential effects to 4 the environment, and the potential impacts to subsistence 5 resources and uses on public lands.

6 The ANICLA 8-10 evaluation done for this project 7 assessed the potential effects of the proposed alternatives 8 and the cumulative case on subsistence use and is included 9 as an appendix in the Draft EIS.

In the evaluation, the BLM finds that the cumulative case may result in a significant impact to subsistence uses. These potential impacts may include reductions in the availability or abundance of caribou. This hearing is being held to provide you an opportunity to make comments on the preliminary subsistence analysis for the Alaska LNG Project.

All comments are welcome, but we especially would like to hear your thoughts regarding mitigation measures that could be applied to minimize impacts to your subsistence use. The comments you provide will be considered in the preparation of the Final EIS and the BLM's record of decision.

You may provide your comments here tonight or submit them in writing. Please submit any written comments to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission by the close of

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1	the comment period.
